The conference offers an inspiring and thought-provoking discussion regarding how Riverside can further develop its local food system to create jobs and economic activity, increases access to nutritious foods, and strengthen communities for a more resilient and sustainable future.

healthy, sustainable, and socially responsible. On March 22, an optional one-day Farm Field Trip will highlight Riverside's agricultural assets.

The conference is scheduled from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. March 21 at UC Riverside's Highlander Union Building. The Citrus Circle Farm-to-Fork Dinner catered by UC Riverside's Dining Services is from 6:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. at the UC Riverside Alumni & Visitors Center. A separate ticket is required to attend the dinner.

The tour of the Riverside's agricultural assets on March 22 includes: the Arlington Heights Greenbelt and Gage Canal, UCR R' Garden and Agricultural Operations, Fox Farm, Unity Farms, and the Eastside HEAL Zone project.
