62. Narrative of Supplemental Report
On February 20th I was contacted by Capt Flores from Special Operations regarding an Officer Involved Shooting that had occurred. I was requested to respond to the scene of the shooting to provide managerial oversight into the tactical operations ref the search for the outstanding shooting suspect. I responded and arrived on scene at approx 0045 hours.

Once on scene I was briefed by Field Operations personnel as to the circumstances surrounding the OIS and the investigative measures taken. I responded to the tactical command post and started preparing tactical documentation of our personnel, assets and deployments. As the on scene tactical commander I was responsible for review / approval and oversight of all tactical plans implemented during the event.

Field Operations personnel were used to maintain a police perimeter around the OIS scene (which was quite large) as well as the residence at [REDACTED] where information / evidence led us to believe our shooting suspect was located.

Tactical resources and personnel were deployed to establish a tactical-perimeter around [REDACTED]. Evacuations of [REDACTED] and several surrounding residences were conducted and as soon as we confirmed the suspect was inside the residence, outside verbal announcements began. Those announcements were made by tactical personnel from the ARV which was deployed strategically in front of the Sage address. These announcements were made in an attempt to have suspect (Marcifino Garcia) safely and willingly exit the residence. We were also concerned there may be hostages and or other occupants inside the residence as the people we evacuated were initially less than cooperative with our investigators. Those announcements were made for several hours and could be heard by our perimeter officers blocks away. Eventually we were told S/Garcia was the only occupant inside the residence.

There was no landline available to the residence so once members from the Emergency Negotiations Team were on scene we deployed a tactical phone into the residence in an attempt to engage S/Garcia in conversation and request he safely exit the residence. The attempts to gain communication with S/Garcia continued for several hours with no contact ever made.

As the attempts at communication continued, investigative personnel worked on the preparation of a search warrant for the residence. We continued to work this event in a slow and methodical manner hoping S/Garcia would eventually surrender peacefully.

Minimal sounds of movement inside the residence were heard. Light sound diversionary devices were used on the outside of the residence in an attempt to get S/Garcia to peacefully exit the residence. Those attempts did not work.

Once the search warrant was obtained we prepared to proceed with our plan to introduce chemical irritants into the residence in an attempt to force S/Garcia to exit the residence. In the event the chemical irritant does not force the suspect out of the residence it does provide a much safer environment for a tactical team to enter into a residence and search for an armed suspect. For hours we had continued with the safest efforts possible that would allow S/Garcia to peacefully and willingly exit the residence and he chose not to exit.

Once the tactical team was prepared, chemical irritants were introduced into several strategic locations from outside the residence. Almost immediately after officer's deployed the chemical irritant, notifications were made that a fire had started inside the residence. Tactical team personnel requested RFD personnel respond and also requested a METRO PACK which is a rapid deployment hose which allows tactical personnel the ability to quickly run a hose to a water source for fire prevention. RPD tactical personnel manned the firefighting duties until RFD personnel were outfitted with tactical equipment as there was still the threat of an armed suspect inside the residence.

RFD eventually made the call to allow the structure to burn itself out. Once the fire was extinguished I conducted a walk through with Sergeant Corbett of the outside perimeter and was debriefed as to the gas deployment entry points.

Investigative personnel took over the scene and all tactical personnel conducted equipment checks and debriefs and were cleared to leave the scene.
