#### FINANCIAL STABILITY IN RIVERSIDE

The City of Riverside is proud to report that the City is on sound financial footing despite the challenges brought on by the current economic climate. The budget closed with a fiscal year fund balance in excess of \$40 million instead of the anticipated \$39 million – a threshold the City Council has wanted to maintain as a prime indicator of the City's financial strength. That exceeds

the recommended 15% reserve fund balances for cities.

As has always been the case for the City, auditors have issued a "clean" audit after review of financial statements for June 30, 2012. Standard & Poor's and Fitch Ratings commented in their audit reports that Riverside's financial management is considered "strong" because practices are strong, well

embedded and sustainable. This is evident in the City's maintenance of a sound financial position over the past five years despite revenue declines.

While fiscal challenges may continue to arise, the City of Riverside is poised to handle them effectively and ensure the highest level of municipal services for the citizens of Riverside.

As the nation struggles with a sluggish economy and slow job growth, the City of Riverside has been executing an Economic Development Action Plan with much success. Each aspect of the plan represents the City's coordinated, proactive approach in adapting our Economic Development strategy to the challenges of the "new economy."

The City Manager's Office of Economic Development serves as the lead staff with implementation done in partnership with other City departments and partner organizations such as the chambers of commerce, business development centers, business improvement districts, and similar business and educational groups.

Between 2010 and 2011, the US
Department of Labor Bureau of Statistics
reports that the total number of business
establishments in Riverside grew by 3.4%
and the total number of employees grew by

1.9%. In the last fiscal year, 1,396 jobs were attracted or retained in the City of Riverside through the active involvement of the Office of Economic Development as well as 9,631 construction jobs. The Office of Economic Development is also working with companies that will bring an added 1,123 jobs once the projects are completed.

Investing in the Riverside Renaissance program literally paved the way for new development. It was a grand statement that said "Riverside is ready and opportunities await." More now than ever, a city must have a strategic and proactive economic development plan in place.

# The Streeter Avenue Underpass Construction Project has begun

The quest to improve travel throughout the City of Riverside continues with the start of the Streeter Avenue Underpass Project. Like previous grade separation projects around the City, the construction on Streeter Avenue may involve some short term inconveniences; however, the completed project will deliver safer, more efficient traffic flow in the long-term by separating paths of travel for trains and automobiles.

On average, 12,800 vehicles per day drive on Streeter and many get stuck waiting for one of the 59 trains that cross Streeter Avenue at Dewey daily. Some of the most dangerous delays are those that affect emergency vehicles, when waiting 3-6 minutes for a train can mean the difference between life and death.

The Streeter Avenue Grade Separation project will lower Streeter Avenue under the railroad tracks. Two bridges will be built - one to carry

traffic from Dewey Avenue over Streeter Avenue, and one to carry railroad tracks over Streeter Avenue. The project will close Appleton Street at Streeter Avenue, but will build new roadways between Streeter and Appleton to provide access to the adjacent neighborhoods.

# Construction will last approximately 27 months (Feb/March 2015).

Streeter Avenue will remain open during construction through a 2-lane detour road to the east of the existing street (between Beatty Drive and Lantana Street). Find out more online at: RiversideCA.gov/gs/streeter.asp

The next time you are considering a night out and in the mood for something different, try one of Riverside's newest restaurants. For sushi lovers, check out AMAYA Japanese Restaurant and Ultra Lounge at the Galleria Tyler Mall. AMAYA opened in January and provides a delicate Japanese gastronomic experience in an alluring ambiance. Translation: great food in a hip scene. #### **February**

Before your plants and lawns start needing more water, give your sprinkler system a checkup. Inspect valves and heads for leaks and fix them. Use RPU's Sprinkler Nozzles rebate program to retrofit sprinkler heads with new high-efficiency nozzles. And consider installing a Weather Based Irrigation Controller that automatically changes your watering needs based on weather conditions (and receive a \$200 rebate).\*

#### March

Turn that utility bill over! It's your 2013 FREE Shade Tree Coupon. Take it to a participating nursery to receive a shade tree to plant near your home or business that will help keep you cool in the summer. Use RPU's Tree Power program to plant up to five more trees and receive up to \$125 in rebates.\*





# COMPLETION COUNTS Creating Paths to College Success

The City of Riverside wants to boost the number of college graduates in the city. Working with Riverside City College, Alvord Unified School District, Riverside Unified School District, Riverside County Office of Education, UC Riverside and the Greater Riverside Chambers of Commerce, the city began the Completion Counts initiative in 2010, utilizing a \$3 million grant from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation.

An analysis of the high school graduating class of 2002 showed that only 15 percent of all Riverside students and only 3 percent of low-income students completed college within a normal timeframe.

Completion Counts is a response to this statistic and designed to increase the number of Riverside high school students graduating from college by ensuring those who want a college education in Riverside have access to one. The program promotes timely responses to college applications and requests for financial aid to help students be able to properly plan for entering college. For instance, in May RCC initiated the "two-year completion guarantee" to pave the way for Riverside high school students to earn certificates or to transfer to a university.

The Completion Counts website (College311.org) provides comprehensive information for students and parents about college preparation and applications, including financial assistance.



City of Riverside spends more than \$1.3 million annually for graffiti abatement. People who are caught in Riverside for graffiti vandalism can face:

- Fines and restitution for graffiti markings (up to \$25,000 for each incident).
- Arrest and imprisonment.
- Community service to clean graffiti damage.
- Felony charges if the cost of graffiti cleanup is more than \$400.

To report existing graffiti, residents can call in using a landline (dial 3-1-1) or mobile phone (dial 826-5311). The phone call takes less than two minutes, and you can remain anonymous.

To report graffiti in progress, go to a safe place and dial 911. Do not confront the suspect. If your report information leads to an arrest, you're eligible for a \$1,000 reward!

TIP: Smartphone users can download the 311 Mobile Phone App to report graffiti digitally. Open App; take a photo; select graffiti as the type of problem to report; enter a brief description of the graffiti then send the information directly to the City for removal.





In the aftermath of Hurricane Sandy and the Nor'easter super storm that followed at the end of October, communities all along the eastern seaboard struggled to bring services back on line. In Long Island, New York, power poles and trees were toppled over adding to delays in getting safe power back to millions of customers.

Twenty four states in the United States were impacted by Hurricane Sandy's winds, rain, storm surge and blizzard conditions which caused 131 fatalities, over 7 million power outages, and over \$100 billion in damages.

To help in the recovery, the City of Riverside sent eight employees and four vehicles. Division Chief Dave Lesh of the Riverside Fire Department was activated by FEMA (Federal Emergency Management Agency) as part of the National Urban Search & Rescue Response System.

Captain Jeff Loveland was activated for deployment to the New York area in support of the rescue efforts being conducted in the aftermath of Hurricane Sandy. Both are members of a FEMA Incident Support Team that provides logistical and command support to the agencies on scene of a disaster.

After a request from the Long Island Power Authority (LIPA), Riverside Public Utilities sent a team of six linemen along with four vehicles full of equipment to aid in the restoration of energy utilities to the stricken community. RPU crews worked tirelessly for 15 days, including through an early snowstorm, to help return power services to the residents of Long Island. "Most of the work we did was overhead," said RPU Electric Supervisor Rick Holmes, "as there were a lot of power poles down and trees that took out lines."

# Eastside Music School

In December, the City of Riverside opened its first music school in the City's Eastside. Kids can learn music, dance, drama and other arts at the César Chávez Community Center on University Avenue.

Councilmember Andy Melendrez and Parks, Recreation and Community Services Director Ralph Nunez helped assemble the program. The goal is to try to provide an affordable program for children who want to learn arts and music.

The school was set up with a small budget comprised of Community Development Block Grant funds, parks funds and private donations. Scholarships will be offered to reduce the cost of classes for students who cannot afford them, and officials hope the school eventually will become an independent, nonprofit endeavor.
